Bicycle Safety Awareness Month: Sharing the Road Safely

Intersections are high-risk areas for accidents involving cyclists. Always yield to cyclists when turning, and be aware of their presence before proceeding through an intersection. "Watch for cyclists when turning left or right," advises the NHTSA.

5. Be Patient:

Cyclists may not maintain the same speed as motor vehicles, especially on uphill climbs or in adverse weather conditions. Remain patient and avoid aggressive driving behaviors such as tailgating or honking. "Be patient and pass bicyclists only when safe to do so," suggests the NHTSA.



6. Look for Cyclists When Opening Doors:

Before opening your door after parking on the side of the road, check for approaching cyclists. "Look for bicyclists before opening your car door," emphasizes the NHTSA (NHTSA, 2023). This simple step can prevent "dooring" accidents that cause serious injuries.

7. Promote Visibility:

Encourage cyclists to enhance their visibility with bright, reflective clothing and lights, especially when riding in low-light conditions. "Use lights and reflectors at night and in low-light conditions," recommends the NHTSA (NHTSA, 2023). Increased visibility reduces the risk of accidents.

8. Educate Yourself:
